Mission 2020

The Barlow Advent Charity Mission has just drawn to a close and, once again, has been a huge success. Our charity work is something that we place real importance upon, as not only does it support those in need in our community by providing much needed funds and food parcels to those less fortunate, but it underpins everything we are about as a Catholic community. This year, our support was needed more than ever due to the Covid crisis and students and staff have rallied together to provide over 100 food parcels for our community, as well as raising money for our chosen charities that include Ronald McDonald House, Cornerstone and St. Vincent de Paul.

Each Family Group was tasked with the responsibility of coming up with a fundraising idea and carrying it out in order to raise maximum funds for our chosen charities. This year, students chose to raise money for Ronald Macdonald House in tribute to the support given to one of our teachers, Ms Quartey-Papafio, whose daughter Olive was born prematurely at 25 weeks and spent the first 130 days of her life in hospital. Our community wanted to raise enough money for a plague in one of the rooms that families stay in when they have a child in hospital, telling Olive's story and offering hope and inspiration to other families in a similar situation. Students' fundraising efforts were supported by staff who during the recent national lockdown took part in 'Olive's Run for a Room', contributing to a total of over £13,050 raised.

Fundraising activities included 'soak the teacher', penalty shootouts, bake sales, tuck shops, movie lunchtimes and hot chocolate stalls to name but a few! A massive thank-you to all members of our community for their dedication and commitment to our Advent Charity Mission.


MENTAL HEALTH
