Green Today, Clean Tomorrow

On 23rd and 26th June The Barlow was delighted to host pupils from some of our local Year 5 classes for our annual 'Environment Week' Mission. Pupils attended from St Catherine's, St Cuthbert's, St Bernard's, St Ambrose and St Winifred's.

Throughout the day they were supported by a number of our GIFT Team pupils and young leaders, who are passionate about caring for our Common Home and sharing this message with others. The groups looked at Pope Francis' Encyclical Laudato Si: On Care of Our Common Home in their R.E lesson, and then they tried to put some of Pope Francis' important teachings into practice by using the 5 R's throughout the day.

In Geography they learned about the danger that plastic waste poses to our oceans, and continuing this theme in Art they used repurposed plastic to create some beautiful print work of sea creatures. In Design Technology pupils again had a go at repurposing materials and reducing waste - each group either created a phone stand from off-cuts of wood that would otherwise have been disposed of, or made a wrap pizza, using ingredients that often go to waste and are thrown away.

The day concluded with a beautiful liturgy, in which the visiting pupils were the stars, sharing their advice and their successes of the day. Each school was gifted a book to take back to their school library that we hope will continue to inspire them on their mission to be good stewards. It was an excellent event that we thoroughly enjoyed hosting and we look forward to welcoming these schools again soon.

Year 10 College Taster Day



Introducing Our Team

The application process for the prestigious positions of Head Girl, Head Boy and their Deputies was more rigorous than ever before. All applicants had an interview with a senior member of staff to secure their position as a prefect for the academic year 2023-2024. Following this interview, shortlisting took place where the 15 candidates' applications were discussed in detail.

The successful interviewees were then set their first challenge. They were asked to deliver a short speech in the Year 10 assembly explaining why they would be a successful Head Girl or Boy. It is very nerve racking to stand up and deliver a speech to 170 peers. The pupils did so well. They were confident and articulate and a real credit to the school and to themselves. Following the speeches Year 10 were asked to vote via Microsoft Teams for whom they thought would best represent the Year group in this very important role. Staff were also given an opportunity to vote.

Finally, the candidates attended a 3-stage interview with the Head Teacher, Key Stage 4 Leader, Mrs Bowyer, and Associate Assistant Headteacher, Mrs Holland. This involved reading a passage, delivering a pre-prepared speech, and answering some demanding questions. All the pupils performed to a very high standard and all showcased their unique characteristics and qualities.

Choosing Head Boy and Head Girl is one of the most difficult jobs in the school year but also one of the most pleasurable. We spent a long time deliberating! It gives us great pleasure to announce that Head Girl for 2023-24 is Ellen T and Boy is Eddie G. We have 2 deputies - Lara A and Kievan D-G and a very strong team of Senior Prefects.



Our newly appointed prefects were commissioned alongside our GIFT Team Leaders on the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul - the first great leaders of our Church.

The Prefects and GIFT Team Leaders of our school, like St Peter and St Paul, have a responsibility to be inspiring leaders and role models for the rest of our pupils. It is their duty now to ensure that they set an example, are a guiding light and disciple of our faith in all that they do.

CHESTER ZOO

Protecting Our Species

On the 7th of June, our Science Curriculum Leader, Mr Sirett took a group of Year 10 pupils to Chester Zoo, for a day of exploration and learning. As well as visiting all of the incredible species, the group took part in a thought-provoking workshop where they learned all about Conservation, and the reasons this work is so essential for many species across the planet.

As part of the GCSE specification the pupils learn about conservation of endangered species in Biology units 6 & 7, so it was brilliant to give them an opportunity to see this in the flesh.

The workshop started by looking at what Conservation is, and why some species require support. Dan, the workshop lead, was amazing at explaining how species are classified according to their EDGE rank, and how vulnerable they are. A number of pupils were genuinely shocked as to how threatened many of their favourite species actually are.

Dan then went on to direct us towards what can be done about this dire situation, and what the impact of active programmes has been to date. The pupils finished by looking at items which have been attempted to be smuggled into the UK illegally, all of which have resulted in the death of an endangered animal.

After the workshop, pupils had time to explore the park, and with such a plethora of different species to see, it was wonderful at the end of the visit to hear their discussions about what they had been to see and why. Mr Sirett said he always makes sure to visit the big cats at Chester Zoo, but sometimes they can be elusive. This time the Jaguar was sat in plain sight, and can be seen from the picture, it's absolutely beautiful.

We look forward to taking future cohorts back to the Zoo so they can have the same awe inspiring experience.

LGBT+ YOUTH SUMMIT

#Proud

The Friends of Dorothy LGBT+ club attended the first Proud Trust LGBT+ Youth Summit in June. Five pupils and Mx Roberts took a day out to the Kimpton Hotel to meet with 36 other schools, some from as far away as South Wales and London.

First, we had a Q&A session with some LGBT+ role models, including drag queen Cheddar Gorgeous, YouTuber Rowan Ellis, theatre maker Kenya Sterling and HIV activist Nathaniel Hall, which was fascinating to listen to as all four panellists had very different viewpoints.

Next, we had a session where the Proud Trust asked us to move from table to table answering questions they had about being an LGBT young person today on a piece of flip chart paper. Not only did everyone write amazing answers, but some people expressed their ideas through drawings, and then other schools wrote notes praising their art work.

The last thing we did was talk about what we could do to make schools better. Each school made a protest sign to say how they wanted schools to change and then we had our own mini protest march. The Barlow's sign says "Make Inclusivity a Teaching Standard" meaning that our pupils would like trainee teachers to show they can incorporate BAME, LGBT+ and Disability inclusion in their lessons in order to qualify. The atmosphere for the whole day was so warm and supportive and everyone was complimenting other groups on their work. In breaks between activities we had dance breaks where everyone stood up and partied to songs like The Macarena and Cha Cha Slide, which got the energy in the room even higher.
