YEAR 7 THANKSGIVING MASS

On Wednesday, our wonderful Year 7 pupils gathered together for a Thanksgiving Mass. This was an opportunity for us to thank God for all members of the year group, who have become valuable members of The Barlow family. The theme of the Mass was thanking God for each and every unique individual pupil, and the contribution they make to our school community, so for this reason, we wanted pupils to play a special part in the celebration.

Members of every Family Group in Year 7 planned and delivered a part of the service; they also created a special decoration for display that highlighted just how wonderful, unique and loved they are. One group of pupils performed an emotional movement to the song "Everybody Hurts" as part of the Penitential Rite. Additional Mathematics GCSE

The mathematics department were pleased to work with a group of pupils to helppreparethemfortheverychallenging additional mathematics examinations in the summer. This course is designed for those pupils that are planning to commence A Level mathematics courses at sixth form college.

We achieved some excellent results with Joseph, Joel & Salvatore all securing an impressive Grade 8!

The process involved individual support at lunchtime and plenty of determination and resilience. Not only did the boys enter the examination, they achieved outstanding results with Eddie, our Head Boy, achieving the highest score in the school with a secure GRADE 9 and Sean Boysen-Lidyard close behind with a strong Grade 8. These grades are a truly magnificent achievement for two pupils at the end of Year 10.

The Barlow is working closely with Xaverian Sixth Form to ensure that their curriculum offer this year provides the necessary stretch and challenge for two gifted mathematicians.



Maybe best of all about Friday, is the fact that it is chip day! CPLD Bronze Award

The Barlow are excited and proud to share the news that we have recently been accredited with the Continued Professional Learning and Development Quality Mark at bronze standard. This involved a rigorous two-day assessment process and the school had to provide a wealth of evidence to demonstrate what we do to support the continued professional development of all staff; both teaching and support.

The assessor was very impressed with what he saw and heard, and feedback included that our application was one of the strongest he had seen in fifteen years. His summary statement about our school read:

'a community of like-minded and committed people, passionate about learners' progress; who feel invested in, through their professional lives and their wellbeing'.

TIME FOR A PUPDATE


Puppy Love

He did enjoy having to eat chicken for his meal times instead of his usual kibble whilst he recovered from the general anaesthetic and he has now learned the word 'chicken' and will run over to the fridge for some as soon as he hears the word! Brosie was back in school last Friday and was, as always, a hit with pupils, spending time with Miss Wright, our Safeguarding Coordinator, who works with some of our more vulnerable pupils, and in the Resource Provision with our pupils who receive supportfromthereduetotheirsocial communication needs. He did do lunch duty outside with Ms Wallace on this day and so was able to get a fuss from lots of pupils and staff alike, which he always loves. Brosie continues to get used to his days in The Barlow and is always really excited when he knows he is coming into school (sometimes a little too excited and he gets in trouble with Mrs Seddon for jumping up and pulling on his lead).

The plan is for a team of staff now to receive training from Brosie's puppy trainer, so that we have a consistent approach for looking after Brosie in school. Once Brosie has slowed down a bit and had more 1-1 training, the plan will be for him to have a timetable that he will follow, where he works with certain staff and identified pupils so that he can do what he does best – bringing joy to peoples' lives. Research has proven that input from a therapy dog can be transformative for pupils, particularly those who are struggling in school, and our intention is to make this Brosie's life work – he just needs to mature a little bit first (and stop stealing carrots)!



THE BIG SLEEPOUT

On Friday 13th October, thirty pupils from Years 7-11 and eight members of staff volunteered to take part in the 'Big Sleep Out', where they bravely stayed overnight in the school grounds to raise awareness and money for those people who are homeless and sleeping on the streets. The event was taking place across the Salford Diocese and is an annual event that fundraises for the local Catholic charity, Caritas. Caritas, meaning unconditional love, work alongside people who are experiencing poverty, disadvantage and homelessness.

Pupils arrived at around 9pm, the fire pit was lit and they tucked into s'mores (toasted marshmallows and chocolate digestive biscuits) and sang songs around the fire. Next, Year 9 led pupils and staff in different dance routines; it was great to see both the independence and support of one another that our pupils showed.

After a film, it was lights out. Twenty participants slept outside under the stars (well, clouds) and the other eighteen slept in the Lecture Theatre. Pupils started to wake about 6am; and they definitely enjoyed their hot chocolate and muffins for breakfast, before they were collected by parents and carers at 8am.

On asking one of the Year 7 pupils at midnight whether she was enjoying the evening she replied 'It's the best night of my whole life.'
